PETER, known as Simon Peter or simply Peter, is a towering figure in the history of Christianity and one of the most prominent disciples of Jesus Christ. His life and teachings are central to the Bible's New Testament, making him a foundational figure in the Christian faith. Peter's journey from a humble fisherman to a bold apostle and leader within the early Christian community is a testament to his unwavering dedication and deep devotion to Jesus.

Peter's name is almost synonymous with passionate commitment and occasional impulsive actions throughout the Gospels. He was one of the first disciples called by Jesus. He became a vital member of the inner circle of twelve apostles. Peter's relationship with Jesus was marked by profound insight and human frailty, such as his threefold denial of Jesus during the crucifixion.

Moreover, Peter also declares Jesus to be "the Christ" (the Messiah) and "the Son of the living God." Peter's recognition of Jesus' divine identity and messianic role. It's a foundational statement that forms the basis of Jesus' subsequent declaration about the divine source of the revealtion upon which His (Jesus') church was to be built.

As documented in the Book of Acts, his post-resurrection encounters with Jesus and his influential leadership in the early church showcase Peter's transformation into an unwavering preacher and dedicated missionary. Peter's enduring legacy, captured in his writings in the New Testament and the memories of his life, continues to inspire and guide believers worldwide.

An Outline

FIRST PETER is a letter that emphasizes the themes of hope, holiness, suffering, and living as exiles in a world that may not share Christian values. It encourages believers to persevere in faith and maintain a godly lifestyle even in the face of challenges.

- Final greetings and encouragement to stand firm in faith.

Chapter One

The apostle addresses early Christians, emphasizing the enduring hope found in Christ amid trials. He calls believers to holy living and highlights the preciousness of their faith, founded on God's mercy. This chapter sets the tone for a letter filled with encouragement and guidance for living out their faith in a challenging world.

I. Greetings and Introduction (1:1-2) A. Authorship and Recipients B. Blessing and Peace	My Notes
Perfer , an apostle of Jesus Christ, To God's elect, exiles scattered throughout the provinces of Pontus, Galatia, Cappadocia, Asia and Bithynia, Santiago 1:1 2 who have been chosen according to the foreknowledge of God the Father, through the sanctifying work of the Spirit, to be obedient to Jesu Christ and sprinkled with his blood: Grace and peace be yours in abundance.  II. The Living Hope (1:3-5) A. Born Again to a Living Hope B. Inheritance that is Imperishable C. Kept by God's Power through Faith Believers are born again to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ. (1:3) Titus 3:5, John 3:3-7 Believers have an imperishable inheritance in heaven. This inheritance is kept in heaven for you, 5 who through faith are shielded by God's power until the coming of the salvation that is ready to be revealed in the last time. 	1:5

7 These have come so that the proven genuineness of your faith—of greater worth than gold, which perishes even though refined by fire—may result in praise, glory and honor when Jesus Christ is revealed. • Believers are called to be holy as God is Holy. (1:15 - Leviticus 11:44, Ephesians 1:4
